Robert M. Morgenthau, the Police Athletic League's President and later Chairman for over 57 years, was widely recognized as a preeminent federal and state prosecutor for over four decades. He retired from public office in 2009 but remained a strong leader and champion of PAL. At the time of his death, he was Of Counsel, Litigation at the New York law firm Wachtell, Lipton, Rosen & Katz; and Chairman of PAL.

On behalf of the 20,000 children who participate in PAL programs annually, and the millions who passed through our doors, we salute Robert M. Morgenthau, hero and champion to New York City's needlest children. He was truly the best friend a kid ever had.

Robert M. Morgenthau was born in New York City on July 31, 1919, into a family dedicated to public service. His grandfather was Ambassador to Turkey under President Woodrow Wilson, and his father served as Secretary of the Treasury under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

After graduating from Deerfield Academy in 1937, Mr. Morgenthau attended Amherst College. On the day after his graduation from Amherst in 1941, he joined the United States Navy and received two Bronze Stars for action in the Mediterranean and the Pacific. His destroyer, on which he served as the Executive Officer and Navigator, was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for action at Okinawa. Discharged in 1945 as a Lieutenant Commander, Mr. Morgenthau entered Yale Law School where he earned his degree in two years. In 1961, he was appointed the United States Attorney for the Southern District

of New York, a position he held until 1970. In 1974 he was elected District Attorney for the County of New York (Manhattan) where he served for 35 years --the longest tenure in the history of the state. In 2010 he became Of Counsel at the law firm Wachtell, Lipton, Rosen & Katz.

Among these extraordinary accomplishments, perhaps the most significant is the impact he made on the lives of New York City's neediest children. For 57 years, he was President or Chairman of the Police Athletic League and provided brilliant leadership and strength to one of the largest independent non-profit youth organizations in New York City. He was a champion for PAL, attracting the support of prominent business leaders to support the City's young people.

As our cover article states, our Chairman, The Honorable Robert M. Morgenthau, passed away 10 days shy of his 100th birthday. We will always be grateful for the 57 transformative years he gave to PAL. The organization has been forever impacted for the better by his inspirational leadership. One of the changes Mr. Morgenthau was responsible for bringing to PAL is now a fully-realized Head Start program in all six of our Early Education Centers. We were made a direct grantee from the United States Department of Education. This will allow us to grow and sustain the program securely into the future.

Of course, PAL staff and PAL kids were busy through the summer at our 20 summer camps. Their days were filled with creative educational activities, trips to NYC cultural landmarks, and our own special events like Carnival Day, Culture Day, Sports Day, and Pennant Quest. These programs bring together kids from all five boroughs to compete with each other in educational and athletic pursuits, while above all else – having fun.

We are now busy in our 20 after school centers serving over 5,000 kids from 2:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. During that time, we not only help them with homework, and provide sports activities, but our Education Department offers a full array of educational enhancements. These are geared to support the participant's classroom development and give them extra skill based activities. We believe this combination of activities provides a rich afterschool experience for kids who might otherwise be unsupervised, and unproductive.

As always, we are grateful to our supporters who make our work with 20,000 youth a year possible. I would like to say a special thank you to everyone who attended the "Tony Danza and the Stars of Tomorrow" benefit last month. Our teen programming is growing and is an integral part of our mission to make sure that every child has the opportunities they need to succeed. It is in this way that we keep Mr. Morgenthau's spirit alive and prove that The Police Athletic League is "The Best Friend A Kid Can Have." We are also grateful for the many memorial gifts that have come to PAL.

At PAL, we are always striving to improve our programs, which are expansive – from Early Childhood Education to paid internships for teens. Since March of this year, we have a new Chief of Programs who will be the driving force to move important priorities set by PAL's board and Executive Director Fred J. Watts.

Though this is a newly created position, our Chief of Programs Danielle Madden-Buck is not new to PAL. Danielle had been the Director of Sports and Recreation since 2015, and was instrumental in reinvigorating PAL's sports offerings, and launching a new model for PAL PLAYSTREETS in partnership with New York City Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice.

A talented athlete and a former teacher, Danielle's connection with PAL goes back to the nineties. "Back then, there weren't many leagues for female basketball players. So we just joined the guys and played 3-on-3 basketball at PAL's open gym in Brooklyn."

Among her many responsibilities, Danielle will continue to ensure that PAL youth spend meaningful time with NYPD officers. "I have a friend who played baseball and was coached by 69th precinct officers. Now my friend is a police officer. Even now, PAL continues to build a bridge between the police and the community," says Danielle.

"My favorite part of working at PAL is interacting with the kids, whether it is sports, STEM, or arts. It allows us to see the impact PAL makes on our young people."

Despite a hectic summer – with 19-day camps, 17 PAL PLAYSTREETS, and over 1,500 young people in the Summer Youth Employment Program – Danielle is planning the launch of a new afterschool year in September. "We are rolling out a new curriculum which will be project-based learning and will teach everyday life skills to PAL kids."

For example, in an activity called "The Toy Store," the youth will learn how to make a toy prototype, make decisions, use entrepreneurial skills, and market their toy. At the end of the learning, young people will demonstrate what they have learned in a public presentation.

"In addition to the upcoming school year, I am also looking forward to PAL Cops & Kids Chorus singing the national anthem on September 11th at Citi Field before the New York Mets game," adds Danielle.

Danielle is welcoming supporters like you to help us continue our work. "Follow us on social media and help us by spreading the word about our programs."

With an excellent balance of arts, athletics, and academics; campers were provided with positive experiences, relationships, and environments which prepared them for a new school year. Mr. Morgenthau's commitment to New York City's kids was a natural fit, as he was the father of seven children of his own. Under his leadership, the Police Athletic League has successfully expanded its breadth of services to include not only athletics but educational programs, social activities, tutoring, creative arts, employment training, and counseling.

Mr. Morgenthau was instrumental in developing PAL's Head Start and daycare programs, and PAL Playstreets. He spearheaded highly successful capital campaigns to design and build new PAL centers in the South Bronx, Harlem, and Queens and to renovate existing facilities

on the West Side of Manhattan. This year PAL celebrated his impending birthday at its annual Superstar Dinner. As he stated in his final public appearance at the Superstar Dinner: "This country and this City provided my grandfather with opportunities— and those opportunities should be the right of all of our New York City kids. I have been fortunate to be part of the Police Athletic League, which makes opportunities for success available to young people in New York."

Mr. Morgenthau was more than "part of" PAL – he was the heart and soul of this great organization. His indelible impact will be felt for as long as PAL exists.

NEW APP IN TOWN



There is something new this year at PAL – the Police Athletic League Parent Notification App. This new mobile app, which comes in English

and Spanish, is available for free in the Google and Apple stores. It is designed to allow our centers to send out notifications to the parents/ guardians of the children in our programs. In the past, if a center wanted to connect with every parent, it would have to call the parents or send a flyer home and hope that it got to the right person. In the rare case, when parents needed to be contacted at the last minute, calling was the only option.

Now centers can send both early notifications and emergency notices through the app. Parents download the app, choose their center, and follow the quick registration steps. Once completed, they will start receiving notifications. The app provides information about their

individual center, including picture galleries, special events flyers, and information about upcoming activities.

We tested the PAL app this summer, and all of PAL's centers started using it in the fall. The app's development would not have been possible without support from the New York City Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) and our individual supporters.

In addition to information for our parents, the PAL app also contains information that we hope our supporters and friends will find interesting. It contains general information about PAL, photo galleries, and the opportunity to make a donation directly from the app.
